

Q. and A. for those who rely on SCDMV-issued identity documents

- **Q.** What documents will customers have in their possession as they wait for their new beginner's permit, driver's license, or ID card to come in the mail?
- A. Customers will leave an SCDMV office with a temporary driving certificate (TDC) if they will receive a permit or license or a temporary identification certificate (TIC) if they are awaiting an ID card. These certificates include their picture and other identifying information found like a regular card. It also has a scannable barcode that will provide the personalization you see on the front. In most cases, customers will receive their new license or ID card in 7 to 15 business days via USPS.
- Q. Will customers waiting on a new card have their most recent license or ID card to use?
- A. Yes, if customers have a card, whether it's from South Carolina or another state, the SCDMV will hole punch and return it to the customer. Customers should carry both the hole-punched card and the temporary certificate with them while awaiting the new card in the mail.
- Q. Will these temporary certificates suffice for businesses seeking to verify that a customer is old enough to buy tobacco or alcohol?
- A. The temporary certificates are valid in South Carolina for the purposes of driving (if a TDC) or voting in an election. Businesses and retailers must make their own decision on whether to accept them for age verification, including whether to accept a hole-punched card presented alongside a temporary certificate.
- Q. Will the under 21 license and ID card continue to be printed in a vertical format for easier identification?
- **A.** Yes, that format will continue. The new design of U21 cards also list the dates when the customer turns 18 and 21.
- **Q.** Can businesses still scan the barcode on the back of the license?
- A. The barcode will be available to scan as before. A portion of the barcode on the hard cards (not the temporaries) is encrypted and will not read legibly during a standard scan.
