Summary of the latest SC Executive Orders

On June 11, 2020, Governor McMaster issued Executive Order <u>2020-40</u>, declaring a seventh State of Emergency for the State due to COVID-19 that remains in effect through June 26, 2020, and lifts additional restrictions on businesses.

The latest Executive Order amends provisions of <u>2020-18</u> and <u>2020-21</u> to allow for the reopening of bowling alleys following guidance from AccelerateSC.

The guidelines for the re-opening of bowling alleys include, but are not limited to the following:

- Bowlers should be spread out on the lanes to ensure that they are 6 feet or more apart.
 This can be accomplished by either limiting the number of people on one lane at a time and/or having an empty lane in between each active one.
- Request that customers bring their own bowling balls and shoes, if they have them.
- Clean and disinfect bowling balls and shoes between users.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces (bathroom doors, sink handles, chairs, etc.) routinely throughout the day.
- Provide hand sanitizer at each lane. Make disinfectant available to customers who want to disinfect their ball and lane.
- Disable video games, juke boxes, etc. OR clean and disinfect them between each user.

Restrictions regarding occupancy in retail stores pursuant to Section 2(B) of <u>2020-28</u> were also amended as a part of the latest Executive Order. Retail establishments across the State are no longer required to limit occupancy to 5 people per 1,000 square feet or 20% of the posted occupancy, whichever is less, but facilities must continue to follow CDC, DHEC, or other sanitation guidance as issued by state or federal public health officials.

Another modification contained in Executive Order 2020-40, deletes Section 5 of 2020-10, to remove the restriction on gatherings of 50 (or more) persons in a single room or other confined spaces at certain organized events or public gatherings at locations or facilities owned or operated by the State, or any political subdivision. All other provisions of 2020-10 remain in effect for the duration of the State of Emergency and all reasonable steps must be taken to comply with CDC, DHEC, or other sanitation guidance as issued by state or federal public health officials.

Pursuant to the extended State of Emergency under Executive Order 2020-40, the following Executive Orders shall remain in full force and effect for the duration of the State of Emergency unless otherwise noted or subsequently altered:

- 2020-16 (Emergency Access Restrictions for Public Beaches and Waters)
- 2020-18 (Closure of Additional Non-Essential Businesses)
- 2020-21 (Relating to Home or Work Orders)
- 2020-22 (Authorization for COVID-19 Support Payments by Employers)
- 2020-25 (Emergency Measures for Unemployment Claims & Benefits)
- <u>2020-28</u> (Modification of Restrictions for Public Beaches & Waters & Incremental Modification of Non-Essential Business Closures)
- 2020-30 (Rescinding Executive Order 2020-14 and 2020-19)
- <u>2020-31</u> (Modification of Home or Work Orders and Authorizing Outdoor Dining)
- 2020-33 (Rescheduling Elections)
- 2020-34 (Rescinding Boating Restrictions and Authorizing Limited Indoor Dining)
- <u>2020-36</u> (Modifying Non-Essential Business Closures Relating to Close Contact Services)
- <u>2020-37</u> (Modifying Non-Essential Business Closures Relating to Entertainment Venues)

On May 21, 2020, Governor Henry McMaster issued Executive Order 2020-37, amending provisions of Executive Orders 2020-18 and 2020-21 (as amended by 2020-28, 2020-31, 2020-36 and extended by 2020-35), that authorized the reopening of certain businesses or venues that were previously deemed "non-essential." Examples of businesses and attraction facilities that were allowed to open throughout the State on Friday, May 22nd, include:

- Zoos
- Museums
- Aquariums
- Planetariums
- Indoor children's play areas
- Historic buildings and sites
- Waterparks
- Amusement park rides
- Bingo facilities
- Miniature golf facilities
- Venues operated by social clubs

Entertainment venues that must remain closed pursuant to existing Executive Orders include:

- Night clubs
- Bowling alleys
- Concert venues
- Theaters

- Auditoriums
- Performing art centers
- Racetracks
- Adult entertainment venues

Governor McMaster also announced that youth and adult sports leagues may begin practicing on May 30th, with competitive play resuming on June 15th. Recreational facilities and activities that were permitted to reopen under the latest Executive Order included:

- Sports that involve interaction in close proximity to and within less than six (6) feet of another person
- Activities that require the use of shared sporting apparatus and equipment
- Activities on commercial or public playground equipment

On May 15, 2020, Governor McMaster issued Executive Order <u>2020-36</u> announcing that close contact service providers, fitness and exercise centers, commercial gyms, and public or commercial pools will be able to open in a limited capacity on Monday, May 18. Commercial gyms will include group exercise facilities such as yoga studios, barre classes, and others.

Close contact service providers include the following businesses:

- Barber shops
- Hair salons
- Waxing salons
- Threading salons
- Nail salons and spas
- Body-art facilities and tattoo services
- Tanning salons
- Massage-therapy establishments
- Massage services

On May 8, 2020, Governor McMaster issued Executive Order <u>2020-33</u> rescheduling elections that had been postponed through May 12, 2020. Under the new Executive Order, any election postponed pursuant to the provisions of Executive Order Nos. 2020-09 and 2020-29 shall be held on Tuesday, July 14, 2020.

The Governor also issued Executive Order 2020-34 on May 8, immediately rescinding remaining boating restrictions and authorized limited indoor dining services effective on May 11, 2020. Under the new Executive Order, restrictions on the beaching or rafting of boats, whether on a sandbar, lakeshore, riverbank, or island, and the requirement that vessels must remain underway at all times unless exigent circumstances exist have been rescinded. Restaurants that elect to provide limited indoor, on-premises customer dining services may only allow 50% posted occupancy inside and should consider and incorporate industry guidelines, such as those prepared and published by the South Carolina Restaurant and Lodging Association, in addition to undertaking and implementing all reasonable steps to comply with any applicable sanitation guidelines promulgated by the CDC, DHEC, or any other state or federal public health officials.

On May 3, 2020, Governor McMaster issued Executive Order <u>2020-31</u> deleting Section 1(B) of Executive Order <u>2020-21</u> relating to Home or Work Orders and modifying Section 4 of Executive Order <u>2020-10</u> which ordered restaurants to suspend on-premises dining.

- Effective at 12:01 a.m. on May 4, 2020, language in the prior Home or Work Order is amended to "urge" rather than "order" all residents and visitors of South Carolina are urged to practice social distancing, limit social interactions, and to limit travel outside the home except for essential business, essential activities, or critical infrastructure operations.
- Effective at 12:01 a.m. on May 4, 2020, restaurants are authorized to provide outdoor customer dining services. Any restaurant providing outdoor dining services should follow CDC and DHEC sanitation guidelines.

On May 1, 2020, Governor McMaster issued Executive Order <u>2020-30</u>, which rescinded the following Executive Orders:

- Executive Order <u>2020-14</u> which required certain individuals who entered the State from an area with substantial community spread of COVID-19 to isolate or self-quarantine for 14 days
- Executive Order <u>2020-19</u> which prohibited individuals, entities, or establishments engaged in short-term rentals, vacation rentals, or other lodging accommodations from making or accepting new reservations from individuals that resided in COVID-19 "Hotspots" as defined by the CDC.
